Projects sustained and undertaken

Brain Science

The pilot project has ended at Mulvery school and the results are nothing unexpected. Both parties would like to continue. We also have now extended the project to another school in the area. More on that when we begin!

I will use Sanah's words here to concisely tell about the project as it is really her baby:

"This year, I worked with URJA foundation to pilot the first extra curricular activity club based on understanding the brain and neuroscience. I have spent the last few years using my experience working with teenagers and teaching psychology, to develop activities and resources for 10-12 year old students. Most international schools and well funded schools are not always open to new additions to their State and National curriculums. The systems are in place and it's not easy to introduce something different.

Thanks to Mrs. Raka Singh, I was able to pilot the brain science club with a school that welcomed this project. As someone who only realised my brain was the most important part of my lived experience at 21, I knew how essential it was for students to know how their brain works so they could learn and understand themselves better."

The pilot programme was run at Mulvery Convent School in Siswa Bazar, Uttar Pradesh, by Mrs. Satya, Mrs. Afsa and Mr. Suraj. They were supported by the team of teachers at Mulvery Convent School as well as the principal, Mrs. Shubra who welcomed this programme without any hesitation.

Health

Paediatrician Dr. Sushil Kumar has patiently persevered with us. It is still a challenge to get patients, but incentives like free consultations, from this year onwards, thanks to sponsoring by
